

## 2016 Medical Malpractice Statistical Summary

Settlement data submitted by attorneys

Lawsuits with final disposition from Jan. 1, 2012 through Dec. 31, 2016

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## **Introduction**

In 2006, the Washington State Legislature enacted comprehensive health care liability reform,<sup>1</sup> requiring attorneys to report medical malpractice settlement data to the Office of the Insurance Commissioner (OIC). Each year, the OIC must post summary statistics about medical malpractice lawsuits that are resolved.<sup>2</sup> RCW 7.70.140 does not have tools for the OIC to use to make attorneys report data. Voluntary compliance has been poor and data in this summary are incomplete. The OIC cannot draw conclusions from incomplete data, so this statistical summary is limited to calendar-year statistics.

There are two types of data displayed in this statistical summary:

- **Total paid indemnity**: Total compensation paid by all defendants to the claimant stemming from a lawsuit. Indemnity payments may come from several defendants if a lawsuit named more than one party.<sup>3</sup>
- **Legal expenses**: All sums paid by the claimant to the attorney to prosecute the claim, including attorney fees, expert witness fees, court costs, and all other legal expenses.<sup>4</sup>

## Key statistics about medical malpractice lawsuits resolved in 2016:

- Attorneys reported that 31 lawsuits were resolved with paid indemnity in 2016.
- In cases where indemnity payments were made to the claimant, average compensation to the claimant was \$1,684,150
- Average attorney fees were \$597,217.

Calendar year comparison: Attorneys reported these data for the five-year period ending Dec. 31, 2016.<sup>5</sup>

**Number of resolved lawsuits:** Attorneys submitted 33 reports about medical malpractice lawsuits that were resolved in calendar year 2016, a decrease of 28.3 percent from the prior year.

**Indemnity payments to claimants:** In 2016, attorneys reported 31 lawsuits in which a claimant received compensation. Payments totaled \$52.2 million, or an average of \$1,684,150 per reported settlement. After increasing sharply over the prior three years, average payments declined slightly in 2016 compared to 2015.

**Total legal expenses:** Claimants must pay fees and costs to file a lawsuit regardless of whether they receive a settlement. In 2016, claimants paid \$21.7 million in legal fees to resolve 33 lawsuits, or an average of \$658,802 per reported lawsuit.

**Attorney fees:** Claimants pay attorney fees based on their contracts, and these fees are related to the total indemnity paid to the claimant to resolve the lawsuit. For 2016, attorneys reported 33 settlements with average attorney fees of \$597,217.

**Reporting compliance:** Attorneys reported a small fraction of the 200 to 350 medical malpractice lawsuits resolved each year. There is no enforcement mechanism in the law, so the OIC expects that attorneys will continue to ignore the law and fail to report settlement data.
