Health reform and what it means for you

Health reform requires most people to have health insurance. If your employer doesn't provide health insurance, you'll need to buy your own individual health plan during the annual open enrollment period. The good news is that if you're under age 65 and don't have insurance or you're struggling to pay for your insurance, you may qualify for help to pay for some or all of your premium. In addition, health insurers cannot limit or deny you coverage if you have a pre-

existing condition.

Free or low-cost health care coverage options

Apple Health provides medical, dental, vision and mental health coverage to people of all ages who qualify. There's no open enrollment period, so you can apply throughout the year. To apply, go to the Washington Healthplanfinder at www.wahealthplanfinder.org.

Individual health plan open enrollment

The 2017 annual open enrollment period to buy an individual health plan ended Jan. 31, 2017, unless you qualify to enroll in Apple Health at www.wahealthplanfinder.org, or for a special enrollment period.

Healthcare for Workers with Disabilities

Program is for people with disabilities age 16 through 64 who meet federal disability requirements and are employed. You must meet income limits. You can buy medical coverage on a sliding-fee scale. Find out more at www.dshs.wa.gov/ onlinecso/hwd.shtml or call 1-800-871-9275.

Pregnancy Medical offers medical coverage for pregnant women who meet income limits, and full medical benefits for the newborn baby for the first year. To apply, go to www.wahealthplanfinder.org. Note: This program is part of the Apple Health program.

Washington Healthplanfinder may offer you help paying your premiums for an individual health plan, if you qualify. The 2017 annual open enrollment ended Jan. 31, 2017. If you missed the deadline, you might qualify for a special enrollment period. To find out more, go to: www.insurance.wa.gov/yourinsurance/health-insurance/individuals-families/when-can-i-buy/. If you qualify for Apple Health, you can enroll in Washington Apple Health all year long at www. wahealthplanfinder.org.

Active military and veterans

TRICARE/TRICARE for Life is the health care coverage program for active duty service members, National Guard and Reserve members, retirees, and their families. To find out more, go to www.tricare.mil or call 1-888-874-9378.

Veterans Affairs (VA) benefits may be available to veterans who qualify for care and prescription drug coverage through a Department of Veterans Affairs medical facility. To find out if you qualify, go to www.dva.wa.gov or call 1-800-562-2308.

Tribal members

Indian Health Service is a federal program for American Indians and Alaska natives. It also may provide health services to Indians of Canadian or Mexican origin or to non-Indian women pregnant with an eligible American Indian child. Health clinics

Health care programs

Aged, Blind or Disabled Cash Assistance Program provides a monthly cash grant to people age 65 or older, blind or who have a long-term medical condition that's likely to meet federal disability criteria. Direct health care practices do not use insurance. The health care providers charge a set monthly fee for all primary care delivered in their offices, regardless of the number of visits. Discount prescription plans are membership groups that may charge a fee for a list of products.
